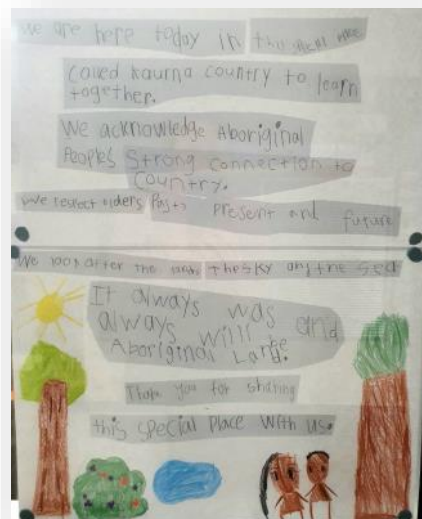
TERM 3 WEEK 3 2022

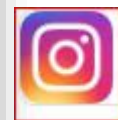

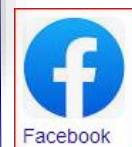

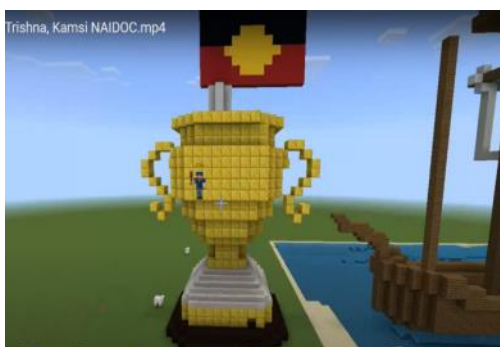
Our students were tasked to represent 140,000+ years of traditional knowledge and culture using digital technologies. This could be representing a traditional practice, song or dance or creating a landscape or scenario that is essential in First Australian history.

First, students researched and planned their design, then created (using Minecraft Education Edition) a display that represents the theme of 2022 NAIDOC Week "Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!"

Using Minecraft Education, I created a scene from the Aboriginal Dreaming Story call the Rainbow Serpent. It describes how the land was formed as the snake slithered around. It was pretty hard to make but it turned out good.

Ms Vicki, Mr Luke, Ms Saraya and the 5/6 students participated in a role play, to teach us about Aboriginal people and the impact of European settlement. Ms Vicki did this by sharing a role play with us. We were split into groups and each group had a large piece of paper to represent the land of the Kurna, Narungga, Ngarrindjeri, Adnyamathanha and Pitjantjatjara people. The role play was set in 1836 to 1967.

Every time a significant event happened some of our land (paper) was stolen. The Europeans brought diseases to Aboriginal communities. They also took Aboriginal kids and women away from their families and made them work for no wages. When we were losing paper (land), some students tried to protect the land and got frustrated when it was stolen. This helped us to begin to understand some of the trauma the Aboriginal people went through.
